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Melissa Clemmer has more than 15 years of experience in public history—primarily interpretive planning and exhibit development. As an associate with Talbott Exhibits & Planning (since 2014), she drafted interpretive plans for the Woodlands Mansion & Cemetery and National Liberty Museum, and curated and designed exhibits at the Willard Library (Evansville, IN).

As an associate with the Drexel University Center for Cultural Partnerships (since 2015), Melissa produced an interpretive plan and all exhibit text for the new Smithsonian-affiliate National Museum of Industrial History (Bethlehem, PA). She co-taught a graduate course in interpretive planning in collaboration with Reading Terminal Market developing exhibits for its 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary, and assisted with an undergraduate course in collaboration with Independence National Historical Park developing an exhibit at the First Bank of the United States (for which she also drafted an interpretive plan). She has also been a consultant to the Barra Foundation (Wayne, PA) and was project manager of the Civil War History Consortium for the Historical Society of Pennsylvania.
